### **Welcome Notes**

I have long been inspired by The Ark's radical approach to art making for children and its original community engagement. Having been appointed Director in 2015 I was keen to introduce a child participation process to redistribute discussion and decision-making power within The Ark to promote and champion children's rights including and beyond the arts. I invited theatre maker, Shaun Dunne to come on board in a newly created role of Ark Artist in Residence to lead our new Children's Council. Launched in March 2016, it marked the beginning of a joyful journey towards rights-based child participation. Since then, more than 300 children, now fondly known as The Alumni, have been members of The Ark Children's Council.

The Ark team have embedded child participation across the organisation and across our programmes in Temple Bar, in libraries and in schools. Children co-curate programmes, create catalogues to accompany exhibitions, generate design briefs, attend shows and workshops and meet artists from home and abroad. As commissioning is at the heart of our practice, the Council are keenly involved in informing the development of new work for production. Every Ark commission includes a child consultation process from the very outset. Given the nature of new work, sometimes several consecutive Councils will have input into the development of a script or a show over many years. This is true of pieces like Peat by Kate Heffernan (2019), The Making of Mollie by Anna Carey (2024), The Haircut by Wayne Jordan and Tom Lane (2019), Songs from the Soil by Lauren Kinsella (2023), and Gold in the Water, a new musical by Shane O'Reilly with Paul Curley produced by Project Arts Centre and Mermaid Arts Centre with The Ark (2023).

Our discussions with children and young people have also consistently expressed their desire for a more central role in artmaking, both on and off-stage. Flies was commissioned to address that desire developing a new model of collaboration over several years. We are proud to present Flies as a work in progress, showcasing the incredible work of its creators and performers. We hope that it is the first of many collaborations between children, young people and adults at The Ark.

### **Welcome Notes**

This piece began in 2020 with an opportunity to write a play for The Ark. I knew I wanted to develop this commission with former members of our Children's Council, as it presented a great chance to retain members who had graduated from our programme.

Initially, I pitched a more direct adaptation of Golding's Lord of the Flies, but it soon became clear that getting a group of young people to engage with such a text over Zoom during the pandemic wouldn't be straightforward. I knew we would need to mess with it a little.

Slowly but surely, we built a process of monthly meetings where we discussed the themes in the work and how they related to our own lives. A personal response. In recent years, when we were able to return to our workshop (now older and taller), we resumed our conversation, focusing on a process-led collaboration that allowed the young people insight into what the theatre-making process can look and feel like.

We soon zoned in on three major areas for the play: a free class, a free house, and a park after dark. Through a series of collaborative exercises, fused with my own writing, we began to develop a new play text where a chorus of young people struggle to engage with the book, much in the same way we did. As they grapple with their report, a new boy enters their community, representing the Piggy character from the original text.

Later on, I became intrigued by the arrival of ChatGPT and AI into our lives, considering how this man-made technology might symbolise the monster, or the innate badness, alluded to in Golding's original work. Ultimately, this is a story about exclusion and cruelty among young people, but it also explores themes of loneliness, technology, impulse control, and regret.

Flies is absolutely not a finished piece; please view this material as a work in progress. We're still very much at the beginning of something yet to fully take form. I'd like to thank our cast for their unwavering enthusiasm and collaboration. We're very excited to share this work with you at its current stage of development.

## **Welcome Notes**

Over the past five years, we've developed this project through a series of workshops with Shaun Dunne, exploring our thoughts and ideas through writing and speech exercises. We expressed our movement in the space through improvisation games and choreography exercises.

Together, we experimented with improvisation, choreography, and storytelling exercises. All of these things over the last few years have contributed to the world-building of this story we wanted to tell, and have been poured into this performance.

What makes *Flies* so raw and compelling is how deeply our voices are embedded in it. A piece about young people, created by young people, is something rare, and that's what makes this project feel so authentic.

The story comes directly from us, and Shaun, our opinions and ideas were always valued and have left a mark on the final product. The performers are also the creators, which we think is a unique and immersive way to create stories, especially ones that are about young people.

The project first began in 2020, when Shaun was invited to develop a new work for The Ark, an opportunity that also created space to continue engaging members who had graduated from the Children's Council programme. Over time, this evolved into a rich, long-term collaboration, bringing together past participants to explore themes of community, identity, and belonging through creative writing and performance.

The final presentation features eight teenage performers, but the process was shaped by the contributions of many more alumni, and collaborators who worked alongside them. The Ark wishes to extend special thanks to all those who have been part of *Flies* along the way.
